DIVINE MERCY
SUNDAY
 (Indulgences)

The Feast of Divine Mercy celebrated this weekend is relatively new ad-

dition to the Roman Catholic liturgical calendar. Revealed by Christ Himself to St. Maria Faustina Kowalska, this feast was extended to the entire Catholic Church by Pope St. John Paul II on April 30, 2000, the day that he canonized Saint Faustina.

Jesus revealed to Sr. Faustina his great desire to show mercy to all humanity, a mercy especially tied to the traditional hour of his death, the three o'clock hour. The devotion has an image of Jesus described from Sr. Faustina's apparition depicting blue and red rays of light emanating from the side of Christ. They represent his mercy shown in the blood and water of Eucharist and baptism. The focus is always on the merciful love of God shown to repentant sinners.

Faithful who observe Divine Mercy Sunday may obtain a plenary indulgence, a "full" remission of the punishment and suffering due to forgiven sin in the afterlife. The Greek word "plene" means full. Venial and mortal sins can be forgiven this side of heaven and the person saved, but there is an experience of justice for these sins on the other side of life that can be quite painful for the soul when entering eternal life. We call this "purgatory." It is not so much a place as a process.

Pope Benedict XVI in his general audience on Jan. 12, 2011, said "*Purgatory is like a purifying fire burning inside a person, a painful experience of regret for one's sins. A soul stained by sin cannot present itself to God. The soul that is aware of the immense love and perfect justice of God consequently suffers for not having responded correctly and perfectly to that love.*" The experience of purgatory comes to an end as the soul enters full communion with God.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The origins of the custom of burning a lamp before the tabernacle are in Jewish worship, where a lamp called *ner tamid* or "eternal flame" burns before the ark in every synagogue. The ark contains the sacred scrolls of the Torah. The flame represents the menorah in the Temple, and therefore is never extinguished. In fact, the word "tabernacle" itself is derived from Hebrew, as *taber* is the Hebrew word for "tent," and hearkens back to the forty years of wandering in the desert. The pilgrim people were sustained in hope by an awareness that God was not only in the pillar of cloud by day and the pillar of fire by night, but had quite literally "pitched his tent with them" in the shelter for the Ark of the Covenant. Some artisans have used this theme of "ark" or "tent" to design a tabernacle for the Blessed Sacrament.

In Christian practice, Anglicans and Catholics use a sanctuary lamp to point toward the presence of the reserved sacrament, and Lutherans use it as a sign of God's presence in the house of worship, but not necessarily as a clue that the Eucharist is reserved. Why, even in an age of electric light, is the sanctuary lamp an oil light or candle? Perhaps not only to point to Christ, the light of the world, but also to point to sacrifice. For the light to exist, there must be sacrifice. The oil or wax is transformed into light, just as those who pray here, or who will receive viaticum from here, are called to transformation in Christ.


Consider the thoughts of Anthony Cardinal Bevilacqua:


Pilgrimage to 100th Anniversary of Fatima & Holy Land September 16-28, 2017
