MAKE *Lent* THIS MEANINGFUL

Lent is a challenging time, a penitential time, but it is also a time filled with hope and the promise of good things. It's like darkness before the light, death before the new life, quiet before the glorious Alleluia. It brings up many images: the coming of spring, forty days of Jesus in the desert, purple vestments, sacrifice, and the deeper desire to help others.

As Catholics we are obliged to abstain and fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday (*only one full meatless meal*), as well as encouraged to abstain from eating meat on the other Fridays of Lent. There is always the invitation for us to consider doing more. Some may try fasting more than the minimum requirements, and eating nothing between meals. Others may try to attend daily Mass, reduce watching TV, and the use of computers and phones. There are those who may abstain from alcoholic beverages or eating out. Giving to the poor might be done in place of what is spent on these other things one has chosen to give up.

Yes, Lent is a call to penance, and Lord knows we need it. We can so easily be persuaded to satisfy our desires to get what we want. With voluntary penance we are saying "no". We freely give up certain things, not because they are necessarily bad. We instead do it, hoping to gain more strength to avoid those things that keep us further away from the Lord.

Lent is a perfect call to conversion. It is a life-long process of turning to the Lord in faith, and turning away from sin. Coming to the Parish Retreat, and Lenten Reconciliation Service can be very helpful in our process to conversion. Our participation in Stations of the Cross and the Liturgies of the Holy Triduum will help us be united even more with the Lord's Passion.



Lent means we will walk with Jesus on his journey

to Jerusalem. "We must now go up to Jerusalem. The Son of Man will be delivered up to Gentiles. He will be mocked and outraged and spat upon. They will scourge him and put him to death, and on the third day he will rise again." (Luke 18:31-33). The Passion, death, and resurrection are the center of our faith. We have been immersed in that mystery from the time of our baptism.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The Blessed Sacrament was not reserved in church buildings in the first centuries of the church. In those early years, of course, people met in borrowed "house churches," gathering on the Lord's Day for community, apostolic teaching, the breaking of the bread, and the prayers, as Acts of the Apostles tells us. Dispersed, people went their way into the workaday world until the next assembly. Weighing down their hearts was the absence of brothers and sisters, not only the sick, but those imprisoned for the faith. No wonder they developed a way of extending the food of the Holy Table to them.

Forty years ago, every altar boy in training heard about Saint Tarcisius. He was a twelve-year-old boy at the time of intense persecution in fourth-century Rome. His community had begun to convey the consecrated bread from their Eucharist to those condemned to death or awaiting trial. Normally deacons did this, but on one occasion, it was necessary to send the boy to bear the holy mysteries to the prison. The legend says that he was an athlete, and was detained on the way by some playmates who wanted him to join in their game. When he refused, they demanded to know what he was carrying. The situation went from bad to worse, and he was badly beaten and died of his injuries. A hundred years later, a pope called him a second St. Stephen. In the nineteenth century, Cardinal Nicholas Wiseman of England wrote a novel in which he expanded the story and popularized it. By then, no one seemed to notice that this twelve-year-old was actually touching and ministering the Eucharist, unthinkable until recently. Scholars say the story rings true: the first reason for setting some Eucharistic bread aside was not adoration, but Communion of the sick.

for he will give his angels charge of you to guard you in all your ways. (Ps 91:11)




