Priest's Retirement Benefit Trust

As of Jan. 1, 2017, there were 57 retired priests in the diocese — these are diocesan priests, religious order priests are provided for separately by their respective congregations.

Many more retirements are expected in the coming years and the number of retired priests may jump to 70 priests by 2025, according to Eric Waldschmidt, vice president at Nicolay Consulting Group, San Francisco, actuaries and retirement plan administrators serving the diocese.

There are about 169 active and retired priests serving in the diocese, and an additional 178 religious order priests.

The diocese anticipates priests will retire at age 70, though some choose to continue working. Currently the average retirement age is 68.4; the average current age of all retired priests is 78.5. But like the general population, priests are living longer, meaning they require support for a longer time.

The Diocese's average annual benefit for retired priests is \$23,700. This is paid from a trust owned by the Diocese, the Priest Retirement Benefit Trust of the Diocese of Oakland.

It is anticipated there will be 69 retired priests by Jan. 1, 2018.

One challenge for the Diocese is that life expectancies for priests is rising, which means that more money must be set aside to care for them. Based on actuarial assumptions, the trust is underfunded at 81%. For the Diocese to reach a 100% funded status by January 1, 2032, it is estimated the Diocese would have to continue its present annual funding/contribution of \$1.5 million through 2031.

To help meet this challenge, a second collection specifically to benefit the Priest Retirement Benefit Trust of the Diocese of Oakland is scheduled for the next weekend. For your convenience special envelopes have been inserted in today's bulletin. We thank you in advance for your generous support.

"The priests of the diocese have taken care of our parishioners, providing pastoral and spiritual care and the Sacraments. Help me in taking care of these priests in their retirement as they have provided for you," asks Bishop Michael C. Barber, SJ.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

On Good Friday, at the heart of the Triduum, the commemoration of the Lord's Passion is colored by sobriety and decorum, but this Thursday the mystery comes in a luminous celebration of Christ's victory. In its deepest origins, the Exaltation of the Holy Cross is the feast of a dedication of a church, since in the year 335 the Church of the Holy Sepulchre was dedicated on September 13, and on the following day the "true cross" discovered by St. Helena was brought outside to the faithful for veneration. It is a great feast of the Eastern Church, which often marks it by having the whole assembly prostrate themselves on the floor honoring the life-giving cross.

At the core of the tradition is the quest of Helena, mother of the Emperor Constantine, to acquire the cross and the nails of the Crucifixion from the ruins of Jerusalem. When she was satisfied that she had found them, thanks to the healing of a sick man whose body was placed on the cross, she had her son fund the building of the great basilica. The history of the relic is complicated, especially because it was carried off by invading Persians in the year 614 and "went missing" for fifteen years. Thursday's feast does not celebrate the relic, but rather the life-giving cross from which salvation flows. It's a good day to look around your house or office: Don't those walls look bare without a cross? What better day to remedy that?

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
A. "Therefore I tell you, every sin and blasphemy will be forgiven men, but the blasphemy against the Spirit will not be forgiven." Such hardness of heart can lead to final impenitence and eternal loss.
