GOD'S WORK


We are so busy! Most of us have more than one job to do, and we never seem to have enough time. We are workers, volunteers, parents, friends, and most of us are more than one thing at a time.

Bread is important in today's readings. The final verse of the First Reading from the Book of Exodus is, "*This is the bread that the LORD has given you to eat.*" This reading speaks of the Bread from Heaven (manna) that fell to save the Israelites as they wandered in the desert. God provided for them, but they did not recognize what was being provided. We are provided the "Bread of Life" through the Eucharist and through our holy liturgies. Sometimes, though, we do not recognize it as we should.

In truth, we need to be changed every time we receive of the "Bread of Life." This idea of change, conversion, is emphasized by St. Paul in the Second Reading from his letter to the Ephesians. Paul is telling us we as Catholics and Christians need to walk — to live — in a different way than the world around us. As Christians we must be prepared to break with the past. We do not just add the Lord to our old life. He needs to become our "new life."

The Gospel Reading from John tells of Jesus revealing that He is the Bread of Life. In terms of chronology, this happens shortly after Jesus fed more than 5,000 people. Many of them sought Jesus out. They were still hungry, but not for food as we know it, but for the Word of God — and Jesus knows that. The Lord says, "*Amen, amen, I say to you, you are looking for me not because you saw signs, but because you ate the loaves and were filled. Do not work for food that perishes but for the food that endures for eternal life*" — in other words, for the "Bread of Life."

When Jesus calls Himself the "Bread of Life," He is indicating that He wants us to lift our minds, thoughts and hearts from earthly existence and to spiritual realities. Each of us needs to put our confidence in the Lord — not in material things. If we accept the Lord and believe and trust in Him, we, too, can satisfy our spiritual hunger.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

In 1794, a young Irishwoman befriended two widows aboard ship while emigrating to America. They bought a house in Philadelphia and began to live a community life under the direction of a priest. Soon they relocated to Washington. There, the "pious ladies," as the neighbors called them, were asked by their priest friend, by then the president of Georgetown University, to begin a religious community. In 1799 they established a branch of the Visitation Order founded by Saint Jane de Chantal and Saint Francis de Sales in the 1620s.

The unique vision of this order followed a sensible routine, less arduous and more flexible than most traditions, and also accepted widows and older women. Amazingly, this American outpost of the Visitation began without reference to the "rule" of the Order. Most of the European convents had been lost under the "reign of terror," and the rules and customs of the community could not be obtained. A copy of the rule was discovered in 1812, and in 1816 the pope officially established the monastery. By then, some French nuns had regrouped, and they sent a habit and cross to be copied. (No religious wore the habit in public in the United

States until after the Civil War.) From the beginning, the Georgetown nuns had an educational mission, even though they discovered in the "rule" that such work was officially off-limits for the contemplative life. In America, the nuns depended on a school for their livelihood, so the rule was adapted. Today, the Academy of the Visitation is a thriving example of excellence in Catholic education, and the adjacent monastery is the oldest monastic foundation in the original thirteen United States.



Q. "A Seventh-day Adventist friend says that since Saturday is the Jewish Sabbath, Christians should worship on this day rather than on Sunday. How do I answer her?"




A. Your friend is half right. In accordance with the commands of the Old Testament, the Jews celebrate their Sabbath on the seventh day of the week, Saturday. However, from the very first days of the Church, early Christians gathered to worship on Sunday, the first day of the week, because Jesus rose from the dead on Easter Sunday. St. Justin Martyr, writing in the year A.D. 155, wrote that "On the day we call the day of the sun [Sunday], all who dwell in the City or country gather in the same place" to celebrate the Eucharist (see CCC 1345.17)

The Catechism explains that the Sabbath was "the day to be kept holy to the praise and worship of God. Just as the seventh day or Sabbath completes the first creation, so Sunday" is celebrated as the 'holy day' by Christians, " Thus the Christian observance of Sunday fulfills the commandment to remember and keep holy the Sabbath day" (CCC glossary-Sabbath).

As the book of Acts notes, the non-Jewish Christians held their religious meetings on "the first day of the week," which is Sunday (Acts 20:7). With the disappearance of "Jewish" Christian churches, this quickly became the norm for all Christians. St. Ignatius of Antioch, a disciple of St. John the apostle, speaks of Christians "no longer observing the Sabbath but living in the observance of the Lord's Day, in which our life is blessed by him and by his death" (see CCC 2175).

So the Seventh-Day Adventists' belief that Saturday is the "true Sabbath" for Christians is clearly contrary to the practice of the early Church. This view is a 19th-century innovation and is rejected by all other Protestant churches, who agree with the Catholic Church that Sunday is the appropriate day for Christians to worship the Lord.
