FAITH FORMATION/CCD CLASSES

We know that the parents, as primary educators, are the first line of catechists for their children. In the family, faith is shared as part of an unfolding daily life. The home, the “domestic church”, provides a place for children to come to understand their faith and learn to love and live it. They learn the most from parental examples set when the family prays together, and actively participates in Mass and the Sacraments. They help their children see what a difference God has made in their own life.

Every year, our Parish provides a religious education program for students who attend public or non-Catholic private schools. Through CCD classes, we strive to support parents in their important work by continuing their religious education that begins at home. Second graders are prepared for the reception of First Reconciliation and First Holy Communion. Eighth graders, and older, are prepared for the reception of Confirmation.

CCD classes begin this Sunday, September 16th, and are offered each Sunday from 9:30 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. This allows time for families to attend Mass either before (at 8:30 a.m.) or afterwards (at 11:00 a.m.).

Our CCD Program is always looking for volunteers who want to teach their faith and share their love of Christ with the young generation. If you feel called to this ministry, please contact our CCD Coordinator, Nadine Ramos, or call the parish office.

As one of the volunteers once said,

“As a CCD teacher, there's nothing more fulfilling than to share my faith and help children explore their relationship with God. It's important to make religion meaningful in their life and to serve as a resource for the parents as they grow in faith as a family.”

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION - In this country, we don't name our churches "The Fourth Avenue Catholic Church," but rather seek a patron saint or mystery of faith. We inherit this tradition from an old Roman custom via medieval England. Interestingly, that has not been the practice elsewhere, and parishes abroad often do carry just the name of the neighborhood. In Ireland, the Roman (English) practices didn't take hold, and so churches are known simply by the street they are on, or by a nickname. Saint Francis of Assisi in Dublin is often called "Adam and Eve" after a pub in the same street. The pub sign is an interesting carving of our first parents, so they become patrons by default.

Increasingly in the United States, we are seeing a familiar European pattern emerge when a few churches, each bearing the name of a patron saint or mystery, are gathered into one parish that bears a different name. Thus, we might hear of a parish of "Midvalley City" comprised of Saint Mary, Saint Francis, and Saint Ursula churches. Once a church has been consecrated, its name may not normally be changed. Therefore, when parishes are merged, a new name is given to the parish, which may or may not be that of a heavenly patron, but the church buildings retain their names. In the process, we have lost sight of some worthy patrons of old, but have also seen new parishes open dedicated to twentieth-century saints like Edith Stein, Katharine Drexel, and Mother Teresa.

Q. "If Jesus was God, why did He say that some things were only known to the Father, like when the end of the world would happen?"

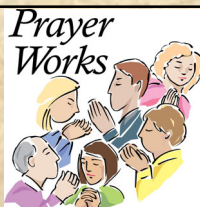


Catholic Answer

A. As we discussed in a previous answer, Jesus is a divine person who possesses both a divine and a human nature. This has been the constant teaching of the Church from the very beginning. So Jesus is fully human, like us in every way-except sin. When the Son of God became man, He took on a true human soul, endowed with human intellect and knowledge. By its nature, human knowledge is limited.

However, because Jesus is a divine person, He "enjoyed in His human knowledge the fullness of understanding of the eternal plans He had come to reveal" (CCC 474). In other words, as the Son of God, Jesus was always united to His Father in heaven-"I am in the Father and the Father is in me" (CJn 14:11). Throughout His earthly life, Jesus' knowledge reveals His divinity: He demonstrates foreknowledge of the events surrounding His passion, death, and resurrection; He discusses the future destruction of Jerusalem; He tells the apostles what events will occur at the end times; and He demonstrates His ability to know the secret thoughts of human hearts.

As to when the end of the world would occur, Jesus does say, "But of that day or that hour no one knows, not even the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father" (Mk 13:32). But this does not imply that He is ignorant in the subject. In the Acts of the Apostles, Jesus tells His disciples "It is not for you to know times or seasons which the Father has fixed by his own authority" (Acts 1:7). In other words, the disclosure of such information was not part of His mission of salvation; He simply was not sent to reveal it (CCC 474).
