

This week's readings teach us that living as Christian stewards requires us to swim against the tide of our "me-first" culture and stake out a path for our lives that may be different from that of our neighbors, friends or co-workers.


Jesus illustrates in today's Gospel. "*Taking a child, He placed it in their midst, and putting His arms around it, He said to them, 'Whoever receives one child such as this in my name, receives me, and whoever receives me, receives not me but the One who sent me.'*"

In this context, Christ is speaking not only of youngsters, but all "little ones," those who are vulnerable or needy in any way — through poverty, physical or mental illness, advanced age, difficult family situations — the brothers and sisters St. Teresa of Calcutta would call "*Jesus in distressing disguise.*"

They are all around us if we open our eyes. Like Jesus, we can put our arms around the little ones in our world and channel some of our energy, ambition and talent towards them.

Giving the best of ourselves to these brothers and sisters may be a little messy at times. It may put us in situations that are far outside our comfort zones. Maybe our colleagues and neighbors will not understand our actions. But in reaching out to little ones in Jesus' name, it is Jesus Himself we are touching. And that is a most privileged way of life.

This week, ask the Lord for the wisdom to see the little ones in your neighborhood, community, or this parish and to show you concretely how you can reach out to them. Take at least one step. You will be stepping closer to Jesus Christ Himself.

## TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

How long have there been parochial schools in the United States? Longer than you may imagine. The Jesuit fathers opened Saint Mary School in Philadelphia in 1782 in the first light of independence. Catholic and Protestant squabbles about the nature of education forced the Fathers to make this risky and innovative venture in the heart of the city. The school was closed by a devastating fire in 1902, but reopened in 1968 as St. Mary Interparochial School, the first example of a shared parochial school. It is also the only Catholic school within the confines of a national park. This is the "Mother School" of this uniquely American institution. Many parochial schools, especially in "national parishes," were established to preserve the culture and language of the "old country," and also to protect young people from prejudice.

In other countries, Ireland for one, the Church is authorized to run national schools, sometimes under the sponsorship of a parish. In still other places, such as Quebec, publicly-funded "separate schools" were administered by the Church. Wherever the state funds Catholic schools, normally enrollment is guaranteed to all applicants. The Quebec system was dismantled in 1998 when the state decided to reorganize schools along linguistic lines rather than religious affiliation. Parochial schools require considerable sacrifice, but they endure as a distinctive treasure of the Church in the United States.

**Q. "Why do Jehovah's Witnesses say that God's real name is Jehovah?"**

**A.** The reason has to do with a mistake made in the pronunciation of the name *Yahweh*, the name of God revealed to Moses at the burning bush on Mt. Sinai (Ex 3:14). The Old Testament was written in Hebrew during a period when no vowels were used in writing. Therefore, the name *Yahweh* was actually written in the Old Testament as *YHWH*. Over time, out of reverence for the sacredness of God's name, it became the practice of the Hebrews not to pronounce it. Instead, they substituted the name *Adonai*, meaning *Lord*.



In order to emphasize this, Hebrew Scripture scholars added vowel symbols into Old Testament texts to indicate to the reader that the name *Adonai* was to be used in place of *Yahweh*. These vowel symbols were usually written below the consonants of *YHWH* to indicate their correct sound.

Centuries later, a number of Christian scholars, studying the Old Testament, mistakenly combined the consonants of *Yahweh* (*YHWH*) with the vowels of *Adonai* to produce what sounds like *Yahowah*. Throughout the evolution of the English language, the letter *J* was used interchangeably with the letter *Y* (just like the letter *v* with the letter *w*). Thus, what sounded like *Yahowah* became popularly written and pronounced as *Jehovah*.

This spelling actually found its way into early English editions of the Bible, including the popular King James Version used by many Protestants. Later versions of the King James and most other English translations substitute *Lord* whenever *YHWH* appears. But Jehovah's Witnesses (and some other Protestant Christians) continue using the name *Jehovah* despite its mistaken origin.
