

PRAYING FOR THE SOULS IN PURGATORY

The Catholic Church dedicates the entire month of November to the prayer for the souls in Purgatory. They undergo a spiritual purification before being admitted to the beatific vision, that is, the vision of God that the saints in heaven enjoy for all eternity.

Those in purgatory cannot pray for themselves, this is why they are also called "poor" souls. They can no longer merit anything for themselves and they must rely entirely on others to pray and make sacrifices on their behalf. As they are nevertheless part of the Communion of Saints, they depend upon us to help ease their suffering and quickly advance them through their purification so that they can join the saints in heaven.

There are many ways to pray for the souls in Purgatory. The most important ones are: Holy Mass, Stations of the Cross, Holy Rosary, Chaplet of Divine Mercy, Eucharistic Adoration, sacrifices and acts of self-denial.

Also, it is very helpful to earn the indulgences. They are the remission, in whole or in part, of the temporal punishment that is attached to the sins we have committed. By earning indulgences through prayer and other acts of charity, we can lessen our time in Purgatory or help those who are currently there. To obtain the indulgence we have to go the Sacrament of Reconciliation and receive Holy Communion on regular bases. We need to pray for the intentions of the Holy Father (*one "Our Father" and one "Hail Mary"*) each day we perform the work of the indulgence. Finally, we are encouraged to visit a cemetery and spend some time there praying for the dead.

One of the most commonly recited prayers in November is *"Eternal rest grant unto them, o Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May the souls of the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen."*

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

In the seventeenth century, English Catholics, many of them wealthy and well educated, looked to the American colonies as a place to regain a measure of religious freedom. In Ireland, the so-called penal laws were even harsher than in England, as a minority Parliament tried to force the conversion of the population by denying the majority political and economic power. Beginning in 1691, laws were passed that punished dissenters, principally Catholics, but also causing hardship for Jews, Quakers, and others. There were acts forbidding "mixed marriage" or sending children "beyond the seas" for schooling. Catholics were taxed at double the common rate, barred from the legal professions and from university, and not allowed to build churches or own a decent horse.

In 1793 the situation began to change, as it became clear that the economic persecution would not drive the majority away from Catholicism. Gradually, laws were repealed until by 1829 freedom was won, although Catholics at university were ineligible for honors, and until the 1920s when the Republic was formed, the Church of Ireland was the state church, funded by the taxes of all citizens.

Q. "Do Catholics try to earn their own salvation, despite the fact that salvation can only come as a free gift from Jesus Christ?"




**Catholic
Answers**

A Catholics fully recognize that Jesus Christ died on the Cross for their sins and thus "opened the gates of Heaven," and that salvation is a free gift which no amount of human good deeds could ever earn. Catholics receive Christ's saving and sanctifying grace, and Christ Himself, into their souls when they are baptized. Yet they also know that Christ has established certain conditions for entry into eternal happiness in Heaven -- for example, receiving His true Flesh and Blood (*John 6:54*) and keeping the commandments (*Matt. 19:17*). If a Christian refuses or neglects to obey Our Lord's commands in a grave matter (that is, if he commits a mortal sin), Our Lord will not remain dwelling in his soul; and if a Christian dies in that state, having driven his Lord from his soul by serious sin, he will not be saved. As St. Paul warned the Galatians with regard to certain sins: "They who do such things shall not obtain the kingdom of God." (*Gal. 5:21*). It must be added that Christ will always forgive and return to a sinner who approaches Him with sincerity in the Sacrament of Penance.

Catholics follow St. Paul, who did not think that his salvation was guaranteed once and for all at the moment he first received Christ into his soul; for he wrote: "I chastise my body, and bring it into subjection: lest perhaps, when I have preached to others, I myself should become a castaway." (*I Cor. 9:27*). Also: "With fear and trembling work out your salvation. For it is God who worketh in you..." (*Phil. 2:12-13*). "And unto whomsoever much is given, of him much shall be required." (*Luke 12:48*). "He that shall persevere unto the end, he shall be saved." (*Matt. 10:22*). Nevertheless, Catholics realize that even the fulfilling of Our Lord's requirements for salvation is impossible without the free gift of His grace.
