DEAR LITURGICAL MINISTERS!

I would like to take this opportunity and thank all of you for helping our Parish Community to develop prayerful and meaningful liturgies. The role of clergy, extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion, lectors, altar servers, musicians, or ushers is crucial when it comes to the celebration of the Eucharist, which is the highpoint of our Catholic faith. Through these ministries, we should be helping our congregation to meet the Lord in His Word and Sacrament. This is a great privilege, but at the same time, a huge responsibility. Being aware of our human weaknesses, we need to reinforce from time to time some regulations which can help us to improve our ministries. The following are some of them:

1. BEING ON TIME

Extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion, lectors, and altar servers should arrive at church no later than 15 minutes before the Mass is to begin. This allows time to prepare yourself, and all you need to do without being rushed. We need time to gather together in the sacristy and say the "Prayer of the Ministers." Being late creates uncertainty and additional stress, which usually will reflect on your performance. Musicians should come much earlier to rehearse your music.

2. ABSENCES AND SUBSTITUTES

If you are scheduled to serve, and know in advance that you will be absent, please arrange ahead of time for a substitute. Sometimes last minute things come up, so if possible, please contact the lead ministers and let them know. This is a sign that you are a responsible person, and you take the important ministry entrusted upon you seriously.

3. DRESS CODE

We need to keep in mind that we are in the presence of God and in his house. Even though the summer brings warmer temperatures, appropriate dress standards are required. As liturgical ministers we should dress in a manner which reflects respect not only for the Eucharist in which we participate, but also for the sensitivities of the community whom we serve. Ministers should not attract attention to themselves, over the Word they proclaim, and the Holy Eucharist they share. Some examples are: inappropriate grooming, clothing that is too casual, revealing, tight, unclean, torn or tattered. Any of these can distract other people from where their focus should be.

If we follow the attitude of St. John the Baptist who once said, "*He (Jesus) must increase, while I must decrease*", we will be fine, our humble ministry will be fruitful and our worship pleasing in God's sight.

Once again, thank you for your dedicated service to God and to our community of faith. May God bless you and your ministry!



TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The premier poet of the English language, Geoffrey Chaucer, introduced one of his most beloved characters, the "Wife of Bath," by this telling remark: "Husbands at church door she had five." Four times widowed, she was setting off on a pilgrimage, notably without number five. The church door is a curious detail, pointing to the fourteenth-century wedding custom of marrying on the porch of the parish church. The goal was to give maximum publicity to the consent of the groom and bride, and so consent was moved from the bride's home to a public venue. The priest would stand in the doorway and begin by sprinkling the couple with holy water. He needed to make sure they weren't too closely related and give them some instruction. He would direct the groom to pay the bride's family a dowry, and then announce the monetary amounts to the interested passersby. Only then would the guests enter the church for the wedding Mass, during which the bride and groom would hold lighted candles. The gradual move from home to church and the shift from the bride's father to the priest's authority helped to protect the freedom of brides who weren't quite as confident as the Wife of Bath.

Q. -Is this Mass valid?
Is the Mass valid if the Priest leaves out some offertory prayers or such as does not wash hands with holy water and does not say wash away my iniquity cleanse me from my sins??

A. Even though the priest does not have the authority to make such changes, the consecration is still valid.


Q. What should a person do if he is receiving messages from Jesus?

It has come to my attention lately that two local people in a neighboring parish to mine have been claiming for several years to be receiving messages from Jesus himself. I investigated some of these claims and have since found that the messages claim Pope Benedict to be the antichrist and various newsletters submitted by the small group of followers amassed blatantly states the encouragement of all to openly question the authority of the church.

What does the Church teach for people in that position of spreading these messages to other people? Are their souls in mortal danger even though they can't stop them?

A. The protocol for anyone who believes he is receiving supernatural messages from Jesus, Mary, a saint, or an angel is to submit the private revelations to the bishop of his diocese for investigation. If the bishop rules that nothing supernatural is going on, and the person continues to be troubled by such "messages," he should consult with a priest and/or a medical professional for assistance in stopping them.
