GOD'S PROVIDENCE

Today's readings celebrate God's providence. No matter how wonderful (or heartbreaking) our relationships are, God always provides for us. No one cares for us the way God does.

Isaiah delights us with a deeply intimate image of God caring for us "as a mother comforts her child." The prophet describes us not as the usual "children of God," but as "babies." We should not resist this image, but rejoice in it. Trusting in God's care, we can all let down our guard and rest like infants in the lap of our mother.

Saint Paul's trust in God allows him to be at peace like this. He boldly declares that no one can "make troubles" for him, because he has given himself completely to Jesus. And when Jesus sends his disciples out to preach and heal, he challenges them not to provide for themselves, but to let faith be their guide.

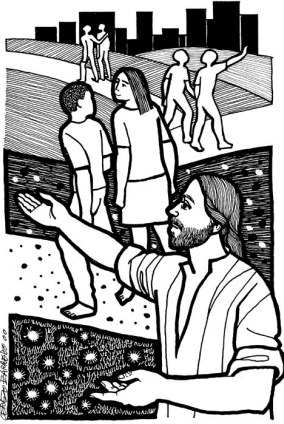

In today's Gospel passage from Luke, we find our Lord appointing disciples to go out and prepare others to receive His invitation into the Kingdom of God. Every verse has something to say about the way a Christian steward should approach others. Let's look at least one of the coaching tips Christ gives.

"The Lord appointed seventy-two others whom He sent out ahead of Him in pairs to every town and place He intended to visit." In His wisdom, Christ sent His disciples out not as individuals but in pairs, as teams. This approach to evangelization certainly provided practical advantages. The disciples could lean on each other for mutual support and encouragement, helping each other to stay on task and to put their heads together to pray and problem-solve.

This teamwork approach is just as relevant to us modern-day Christian stewards. It takes courage and commitment to go out and invite others into the Christian life. We need to work together to do it well.

But there is also symbolic importance to working in teams. It points to the reality that when we invite others to embrace the Good News of the Gospel, we are not merely inviting them into a belief system, but into a relationship with Christ and through that relationship, into Christ's family — our fellow Christian disciples near and far.

Our parish is our immediate spiritual family in this extended worldwide fold. We are not meant to live as isolated individuals within the parish any more than we are meant to live in isolation within our families. We are meant to be a community. That is why it is so important for us to foster a vibrant, supportive, welcoming parish life. This is why we emphasize hospitality as one of the pillars of stewardship. It is not enough just to point others to Christ, we must invite them to join us in community with Him; we must offer a place and mission for them in the Church and within our parish family.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

It's high summer now, school is out, the pace of work slows, and some people drift away. There are visitors in the churches every summer, and familiar faces are "among the missing." Some find the summer's call more appealing than the summons of the church bells. Many, however, would not dream of missing a Sunday, and so they make their way to Mass in unfamiliar places, watching the locals for clues as to when to sit or stand, where the Communion stations are. In answering the call, they keep the "sabbatical" rhythm of the Christian life: every seventh day, the Body of Christ assembles for worship.

For centuries, there was no obligation to Sunday Mass in the sense of a written law, but Christians have always yearned to be together on Sunday. In the city of Abitina, during a persecution by the Emperor Diocletian, a group of Christians were urged to stop worshipping together on Sundays. They responded, "Then take our lives, for without the Sunday we cannot live." By a curious coincidence, the appointed readings today center us on thoughts of peace. On our Independence Day, the experience of worship situated us in community, and evoked a commitment from us to be advocates of peace in all aspects of our society's life.

Q. Who is the Antichrist?

A. Astrologers claim that the Antichrist will come during a conjunction of Jupiter with the moon. but they do not say who he will be. If you want to stay in the New Testament, specifically in Revelation, to find the Antichrist you have a wide choice of monsters besides the beast mentioned in the Book of Revelation. But, before you make any choice, you ought to look into the term *Antichrist* to see how the Catholic Church arrived at its teaching that he will be a human enemy of Christ who will come only in the last days of the world.

First of all, he is named only in the Epistles of St. John. No other writer of Scripture uses the term *Antichrist*, but Catholic teaching identifies him with "the man of sin" St. Paul talks about in his Second Letter to the Thessalonians. The mistaken idea that there are two equal gods, one good and one bad, is the basis of several ancient religions, and St. Paul may even have been accommodating a pagan false teaching to Christian truth. These Antichrists are evidently some people who joined the Church but then left it and did so denying Christ. But he speaks also of *the* Antichrist in the singular and as though the last hours of the world were at hand as he (John) was writing. This is where we get the idea that the Antichrist will come only as the world approaches its end.

In his Second Letter, John speaks of the Antichrist as one who will "not acknowledge the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ in the flesh." That is where we get the Catholic teaching that the Antichrist must be the one whom St. Paul calls "the man of sin, who opposes ... all that is called God." This man of sin, St. Paul says, will be destroyed by Christ at His (second) coming, at the end of the world. Apart from this we don't know much about the Antichrist. But the Church is against the idea that *the* Antichrist is a character in past human history or even one of our own time, unless the world is indeed nearing its grand finale.
