## GOD'S CALL

The person who has been “saved,” who has “heard the good news of salvation,” still lives in an unsaved world, a world sadly oblivious to the presence of God.


Today’s readings outline how the disciple is present in the world.

The outline begins with Isaiah: “Share your bread . . . shelter the oppressed . . . clothe the naked” (Isaiah 58:7). Those who hear the word of salvation are not insensitive to the urgent needs of others. Then Paul reminds his flock that he brought Christ to them not in eloquence or wisdom, but by being with them in the “weakness and fear” of their daily lives (1 Corinthians 2:3).

Finally, Jesus tells his disciples to go out into the gloom and darkness of the streets of the world and let God’s light shine through their good deeds. We disciples don’t save the world. To the extent, however, that we have heard the word of God and been awakened to God’s presence, we may spread that word and bring that presence to others.

**SAINT JOSEPHINE BAKHITA (c. 1869-1947)**

February 8

"Save Darfur!" That cry echoes around the world and in the heart of the Church, where a child of Darfur is one of our newest saints: Josephine (her baptismal name) Bakhita ("Lucky One," the slave-traders' nickname). Kidnapped at nine, sold in Sudan's slave-markets, flogged daily till covered with scars, Bakhita was finally bought by Italians and taken to Italy.

There Bakhita discovered a "Master" who had himself been flogged to redeem her from slavery! "I am truly loved," she thought, "and awaited by this Love." Baptized, she often kissed the baptismal font, exclaiming, "Here I became a daughter of God!" For fifty years as a Daughter of Charity, Bakhita provided cheerful hospitality to all who knocked at the convent door. In her final illness, she relived slavery's horror: "Please, loosen these chains," she begged the nurse. "They are so heavy!" Her last words were: "Our Lady! Our Lady!" John Paul II canonized her in the Jubilee Year 2000, praising God for leading her "from abject slavery to the dignity of being your daughter and the Bride of Christ."

**Q. Why shouldn't all Christians be allowed and encouraged to take part in the Eucharist? Wouldn't this be a giant step toward Christian unity?**

**A.** "Christian unity" needs an exact definition. As it stands it can mean doctrinal, disciplinary, or political agreement. Calling on everybody to take Communion could possibly benefit some kind of political unity, but certainly would not lead to doctrinal or disciplinary unity.

As a matter of fact, all truly ecumenical organizations begin with the understanding that they are not in business to change anyone's beliefs. Their purpose is to promote "dialogue," leading to understanding of the attitudes of other Christians and to the elimination of misunderstandings which in the past have been serious enough to lead to hatred and open war.


Another consideration is that the Eucharist in Catholic theology is not a means toward any other end. It is itself the final and supreme act of worship, the union of human beings with Christ in the perfect and all-sufficient sacrifice of Himself for our sakes. It takes considerable study and good will to come to that knowledge and belief.

To participate in the Eucharist merely physically and not with full spiritual understanding is not really a rational act.

Again, terms need definition. For certain Protestants whose belief is that the Eucharist is only a symbol of unity, and without other meaning, the act of participation within their own denomination can be rational. But the doctrinal Eucharistic unity of Christendom has been broken through the centuries by denominations which do not accept the doctrines which obtained when that Eucharistic unity prevailed.
