

THE BISHOP'S LETTER FOR 2018 APPEAL

As loving servants of our Lord, we should always strive to put our faith first. Through and in our Church, we live our faith. The Church is a leader, an example, and a beacon of light we can follow. The 2018 Bishop's Appeal is upon us. This year, I have chosen ***Lighting the Way*** as the Appeal theme to reflect the Church's leadership and guidance to all people. Our faith and church serve as our candle, shining brightly before us, lighting our path.

Last year, the goal for the Appeal was \$2.5 million and we successfully raised nearly \$2.8 million. This success would not be possible without the tremendous generosity of our donors. The brochure included with this letter shows the almost \$7.9 million in centrally supported services and ministries at the Diocese, which the Bishop's Appeal helps fund. In order to support the needs of these invaluable services and ministries, we have decided to raise the Bishop's Appeal goal to \$3 million.



TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Today's Gospel centers on the plight of a leper and Jesus' response of healing. In Hawaii, the bacterium that causes leprosy probably entered from China in the mid-1800s, and the native islanders were susceptible to the dreaded disease. In 1866, the government literally dumped the sufferers on a remote and virtually inaccessible island peninsula with towering cliffs. Thrown off ships into the sea, the sick people were told to swim for the beach and head for caves, and for seven years the only supplies were similarly cast into the sea to drift ashore. It was then, 1873, that a thirty-three-year-old Belgian priest, Damien de Veuster, went voluntarily to Kalaupapa. Before long, he cajoled the government into funding his mission and its hospital, built a village with proper homes and sanitation, and recruited Mother Marianne Cope to bring sisters from Syracuse, New York, to nurse the sick. Damien, who eventually died of leprosy, has been canonized, and Mother Marianne as well.

Although leprosy has been curable since the 1940s, today a few patients remain in their lifelong home, now a national historic site. The peninsula is still utterly isolated from the outside world, and the speed limit for the few cars there is 5 mph since there's nowhere to go! The hospital is still well-staffed and equipped, but access is regulated and visitors must take an official tour, often involving a descent down the cliffs by "Molakai mule." There are few places on earth that evoke the healing power of Jesus, or our call to follow the Healer, more than Damien's beloved island mission.


Q. Why, if Christ drove the money-changers from the Temple, do Catholic parishes have bingo, bazaars, carnivals, and even gambling sometimes ?

A. such practices it would be well to remember the situation which the Lord attacked. In his time each Jew paid a Temple tax, usually on the occasion of a visit to the Temple. People came to the Temple from all over the world and had only foreign currency which they had to exchange for the sanctuary shekels with which law required the tax to be paid. Since He called the money-changers thieves, we can take it that they were cheating the visiting pilgrims. They were also bankers, running a side-line business which had no connection with the Temple worship. They paid a percentage of their take to the priests in charge of the Temple revenues, but this money went to individuals and was not part of the Temple income.

Modern church bingo would be wrong if the parish priest hired operators to rip off the parishioners and took a part of the profits for themselves, all in the name of religion. But few, if any, church bingo games or other activities you mention involve cheating. They are not intrinsically evil as some Christian Churches have wrongly concluded. They are certainly not ideal ways of getting money for the use of the Church, which would be donation and collections as in Apostolic times. I have heard of an organization that pays all its bills that way (it is a golf club), but all the members are generous millionaires. Most parishes have to wheedle part of their income from people by providing a little innocent fun in exchange for donations.
