

Stewardship Bulletin Reflection

April 15, 2018 — Third Sunday of Easter

**ACTS 3: 13-15, 17-19; PS 4: 2, 4-9;
 1 JN 2: 1-5A; LK 24: 35-48**

The final line of the First Reading from the Acts of the Apostles is, “*Repent, therefore, that your sins may be wiped away.*” This is part of a message which Peter evidently often stated as he evangelized and spread the word about the saving grace of Jesus Christ.

Penance, repentance, is an important part of our Catholic faith. One of our seven Sacraments, there is much in Church doctrine about the importance of this sacrament. The Catechism of the Catholic Church (#1424) it states, “*It is called the sacrament of confession, since the disclosure or confession of sins to a priest is an essential element. In a profound sense it is also a “confession”— acknowledgement and praise— of the holiness of God and of His mercy toward sinful men and women.*”

When St. Peter was speaking and used the term “wiped away,” that had more meaning to the people of his time. Imagine if sins were listed on a document in ink. In ancient times the ink had no acid content, and thus it could be “wiped away” with a damp cloth. That was the image Peter was presenting. For us going to confession literally “wipes away” our sins.

God’s forgiveness is central to the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The Sacrament of Confession (reconciliation) means that from God’s perspective it is as though our sins have never even occurred. In the Book of Hebrews the Lord declares, “*I will never again remember their sins*”— after repentance, that is.

ACT OF CONTRITION

*O My God, I am sorry for my sins with all my heart.
 In choosing to do wrong and failing to do good,
 I have sinned against you, whom I should love
 above all things.*

*I firmly intend, with the help of your grace,
 to do penance, to sin no more and to
 avoid whatever leads me to sin. Our
 Savior, Jesus Christ, suffered
 and died for us.
 In His Name, O Lord, have mercy.*

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

There are many ways in which religious communities are organized. Some have a central authority in a congregation, and others have a "rule" that is shared by all the members, but are a kind of federation of independent houses. Sometimes, congregations with distinct histories and ministries decide to merge. Several years ago, one of the largest mergers on record took place. Seven independent congregations of Dominican women religious, most in the Midwest, are now one new congregation enfolding more than seven hundred members spanning thirty-six states. The oldest of the founding groups, the so-called "Kentucky Dominicans," began as a frontier community in 1822. Other communities have European roots. To get to this historic moment, the sisters spent many years in conversation, and approved the new structure by a two-thirds majority vote. This was then ratified by the Holy See. The merger allows the sisters to pool their resources in order to be more effective in ministry. They are living the Paschal Mystery, experiencing Christ's dying and rising in an inspiring way.



Q. I was told growing up Catholic, that no priest had ever revealed anything he had ever heard in confession, no matter what his character Is this true?



A. First, to prove it true, even to yourself, you would have to have perfect knowledge of every act in the life of every priest who ever heard a confession. Practically speaking it is impossible to prove a universal negative. Another reason for not believing that the seal of confession has been perfectly observed is that the Church has always had laws about it and specified penalties for priests who break the seal, which would be absurd if there were never any cases of its being broken. The seal of confession has been sensationalized in Gothic novels about the days when kings and queens had private confessors who advised them in civil as well as moral matters and who received information about kingly political plans and intentions at the same time. In real life, what is told in confession is pretty drab and from one penitent to the next repetitive to the point of boredom. Nearly all civilized states have laws protecting the confessor in his obligation of secrecy, but in the rare cases where a confessor might in some way benefit by "revealing" sins, who would believe he was telling the truth? Most codes of civil law forbid the introduction of evidence received in confession, not only to protect the confessor but also to protect the court from testimony offered by a person admitting sacrilege by the very act of testifying.


