



Walking with Jesus on “The Stations of the Cross”

The Stations of the Cross is an ancient form of prayer that has taken on new meaning for Catholics of all ages today.

Sometimes people called them “The Way of the Cross”, “Via Crucis” or “Via Dolorosa”.

This prayer is rooted in the Holy Land, where early Christians followed Jesus' path to Calvary, stopping at various points to pray and meditate. Some say Mary, our Blessed Mother started the practice but there is no documented proof of this.


When Christianity spread to other parts of the world, it was difficult and often impossible for many Christians to travel very far from their homes, much less to Jerusalem to follow Jesus' way to Calvary. They started to build the replicas of Jerusalem's shrines in their own countries.

Most of the early *Stations of the Cross* consisted of seven Stations. It was not until 1731 when Pope Clement XII established the 14 Stations of the Cross as we know them today. They can be found on the walls of Catholic churches and many also are available outdoors. Although the number of Stations remains officially at 14, some churches have added a 15th for the Resurrection.

The Stations of the Cross continue to be a favorite form of group prayer for Lent but there is also growing interest in using them for private meditation throughout the year. Even if we cannot physically go to the Holy Land, we can journey there spiritually when we meditate on Christ's path to Calvary.

Over the years many different people or religious groups have written their own versions of *The Stations of the Cross*. Some of the most beloved include St. Alphonsus Liguori, St. Francis of Assisi, and the Stations with Scripture verses. You probably have your own favorite!

Please come and join us each Friday as we pray *The Stations of the Cross* together. We say this powerful prayer after the 9:00AM Mass, and at 7:00PM.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The second Sunday of Lent every year recalls the Transfiguration of the Lord. Since the fourth century, Mount Tabor has been the focus of devotion to this event. As mountains go, it is not particularly lofty, rising about fifteen hundred feet, within view of the Sea of Galilee and very close to Nazareth. Scripture doesn't identify the mountain, but in the year 348 Saint Cyril of Jerusalem said he preferred Mount Tabor to Mount Hermon as the site of the Transfiguration, and his opinion won. It has long been a strategic military site, and ancient fortresses are visible on the heights. Over the centuries, churches and fortified monasteries rose on the mountaintop, only to be destroyed by various invaders. Six hundred years ago, local Christians started to decorate the ruins with flags and banners on the Feast of the Transfiguration. In 1631, the Sultan granted permission to the Franciscans to live on Mount Tabor, and they have been there ever since, discovering the ruins of an old Crusader church and constructing the present church on the site in 1924.

The top of the mountain is divided into Greek Orthodox and Latin (that's us) zones. At one time, tourists arrived on the summit by bus, but this is no longer permitted. Some ride bicycles up a challenging and winding path, while others take the four thousand three hundred steps constructed for Christian pilgrims in the fourth century. It's hard to imagine the fishermen following Jesus up this craggy mountain without complaint. Visitors will sympathize with Peter's plan to construct booths and stay put with Jesus, Moses, and Elijah for a while, enjoying the view, and planning the trip back down.

Catholic Answer

Q. Are we to believe that Jesus as a child had to learn His ABCs like other children? Since He was God as well as a man wasn't He born knowing all things?

A. Yes, but things like the ABCs were learned as a part of what is called His "experimental knowledge." The Epistle to the Hebrews says He learned obedience through what He suffered." Christ knew what leaned obedience was, but He added practical human experience to the theoretical knowledge He already had. Another name for His theoretical knowledge is "infused knowledge." Christ had knowledge of things like matrix algebra, propositional calculus, and atomic physics, but not the experience of using it. Had the occasion arisen His human mind could have invented the music of Bach, the mathematics of Einstein, or the artificial intelligence of the computer. In addition to experimental and theoretical (infused) knowledge, He had the Beatific Vision of God, the supreme knowledge which other men and women can attain only after death.

How and on exactly what these various kinds of knowledge operated will remain forever mysterious to us. We can say that His teaching in the Temple at the age of twelve was merely the action of a bright boy, but such claims as His "I and the Father are one" are not the result of any human knowledge. Modernistic Christian theologians who preach such things as that Christ did not know He was the Messiah until His baptism by John, do not begin with the belief that He was God and had the Beatific Vision from the instance of His human conception. It is true that in His ordinary actions there was nothing to indicate His possession of divine knowledge. But we know it was there from His extraordinary actions, such as the predictions of the manner of His death and His resurrection.
