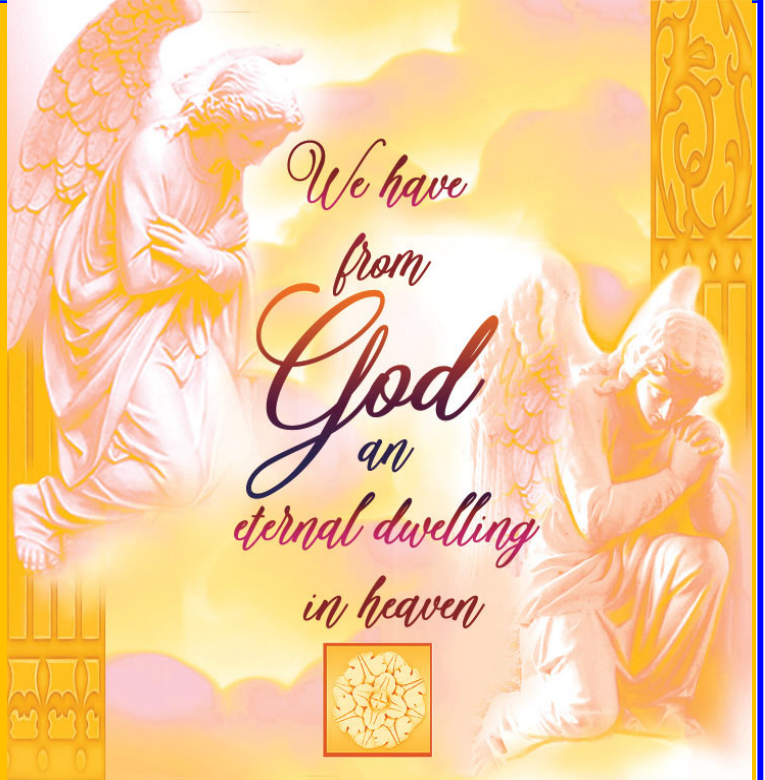


## PROMISES

## Stewardship Bulletin Reflection

**June 10, 2018 —  
Tenth Sunday  
in Ordinary Time**

**GN 3: 9-15; PS 130: 1-8; 2 COR: 4:13-5:1; MK 3: 20-35**

In today's First Reading from the Book of Genesis we hear the story of Adam and Eve and their sins, defying God. However, when God was present in the garden, the man and woman hid themselves. Adam responds to God's question why in part by saying *"I was afraid... so I hid myself."* Did he, do any of us really think he could hide from God?

As children many of us may have hidden from a parent when we did something wrong and it was in violation of some specific order we had received. Our efforts to hide what we did and to hide ourselves were probably no more effective than Adam's.

As humans we know the temptation of following our own plans, even if they are contrary to God's. We think we know better and we may try to still have it our way. If what we have done is particularly shameful, we may try to hide our sins from God.

The sincere truth is that we cannot hide from God any more than Adam and Eve could. Psalm 139 declares, *"Where can I hide from your spirit (God's)? From your presence where can I flee? If I ascend to the heavens, you are there; if I lie down in Sheol (the place of the dead) you are there, too. If I say 'Surely darkness will hide me'... Darkness is not dark for you."*

What are we hiding from? In recent weeks we have learned over and over how much God loves us. It is time for us to accept that and not hide.

**TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION**

The cathedral is a treasure in a diocese and in our tradition. It is not simply a "big church," as some say; some parish churches are larger. What makes a cathedral is the presence of the chair, called a *cathedra* (Latin for seat) reserved for the bishop.

There are many instances in our country of a local church (diocese) outgrowing a cathedral. In Baltimore and St. Louis, the former cathedrals are historic treasures in the heart of the old city, but new and larger structures now function as the seat of the bishop.

When a bishop dies or retires, it is said that "the seat is vacant," and when the new bishop is installed, the central ritual is the moment when the decree of the Holy Father is read and the new bishop is escorted to the *cathedra*. No one but the bishop sits in the *cathedra* during a ritual, but in Los Angeles the *cathedra* in the Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels is accessible, and no one seems to mind when a visitor tries the *cathedra* out for the bishop's point of view.

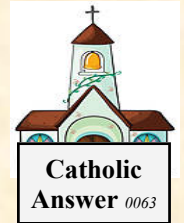

**Q** Is it proper to make the Sign of the Cross after receiving the Holy Eucharist? Please clarify - a friend said that after receiving the Lord Jesus in the Holy Eucharist, it is no longer necessary to make the sign of the cross, because we already have Him inside our body. What is the proper manner one should take ?



**A.** The Sign of the Cross is an outward expression of our adoration of the Holy Trinity and also of God's fullest human expression of His divine love for us as depicted by His Passion. It is ALWAYS appropriate to make. It is something that even the angels cannot do, since it requires a body. We cover our bodies with it as a response to His love.

**Q.** Is a catholic marrying a non-catholic a sin?

**A.** I have no idea where this is coming from. Either you have the story wrong or the brother is very wrong. A Catholic is free to marry a non-Catholic, the Church only asks that the Catholic party affirm that they will remain Catholic will raise any child of the marriage as a Catholic.

There is a process that is to be followed when a Catholic marries a baptized non-Catholic or an unbaptized person. As long as that process is followed then the marriage is indeed valid. If the Catholic party does not follow the process then the marriage would be invalid.

As long as the Catholic party is following the rules/process of the Catholic Church then there is no sin and everything is valid.
